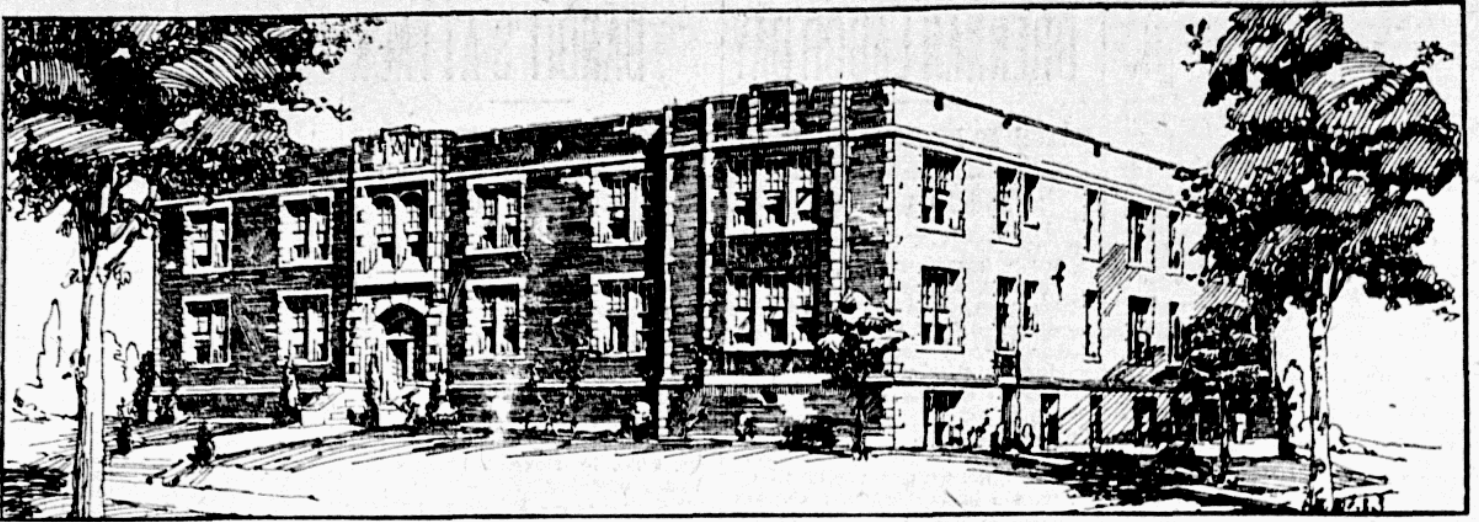


PLANS COMPLETED FOR DORMITORY AT MASONIC HOME



Plans for the first of two dormitories to be built at the Masonic Home and School near Fort Worth have been completed and bids soon will be received on the contract for constructing the building, it was announced Friday by Herbert M. Greene, architect.

The building is to be entirely fireproof construction, being two stories and basement. It will be of "L" shape to afford the best possible exposure, the sides of the "L" being 102 and 107 feet in length. The exterior materials will be brick and stone and the design of the structure is to be of modified Tudor in harmony with the more recent buildings erected from plans by the same architects. This building will be the fourth modern fireproof building to be built on the Masonic grounds, the previous buildings having been the boys' dormitory, the school building and the hospital.

The dormitory will house seventy-five of the older girls between the ages of 12 and 15 years. The first and second floors are divided into rooms accommodating from two to four girls, while on the first floor there will also be a large living-room with a porch facing the south. The basement is given over to a large sewing and ironing-room, in addition to the storage space for supplies.

The completed building, the plans for which are now under way in the architect's office, will cost approximately \$140,000. Shortly after the completion of this dormitory it is the plan of the Masonic board to erect a larger dormitory building which will house approximately 140 of the smaller girls.
