About Alerting Services

- Enables you to receive instant updates about recently published articles, table of contents and journals either by e-mail or by RSS.
- Emails and RSS feeds may include links to full-text for articles available through UT.
- Free, but in most cases, you'll need to create an account.
- Commonly called Alerts, also look for:
 - E-mail or RSS
 - eTOCs (electronic table of contents)
 - Saved Search



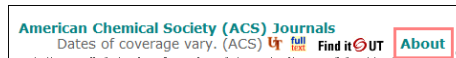
Receiving Updates

By Journal

Start here → After finding your journal via [Find a Journal](#), from the SFX window, select the database that provides that journal; it should bring you to the index for that journal. Look for links to Alert, RSS, or Email.

By Publisher

Start here → If you know the publisher of the journal or group of journals, select it from the [Alerting Services](#) list. Select the **About** button to learn specifically what types of alerts are available from that publisher.

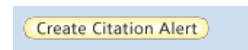


By Topic

Start here → If you are doing long-term research and want to stay up to date on a specific topic, using a **Search Alert** within a database will notify you of new articles that have been added that match your search terms. After you perform a search in a database, on the results page, look for a place to Set up an Alert or an RSS feed. Follow the instructions to modify your alert.

By Citation

Start here → To create alerts of new articles that cite a specific articles, use **Web of Science's Cited Reference Search** to find citations by Author, Journal or Date of Publication. After selecting your citation from the results list, use the **Create Citation Alert** button on the right hand side to enable your alert.
